

The Leader of Merton Council, Councillor Stephen Alambritis, writes for My Merton



There's been a lot in the newspapers recently about children from Syria and other war torn countries who are stuck in refugee camps

with no family to look after them. I don't think any of us can imagine how scary that must be for a child, and I know that the community in Merton is doing a great deal to extend our support to refugees, and children in particular. You can read more on page five.

Their experience makes me realise how lucky we are to live here in Merton. More and more people are moving here because we're a great place to have a family and for kids to grow up. Our schools are some of the most improved in the country and we have amazing parks, playgrounds and leisure centres. And we'll soon have a brand new secondary school in South Wimbledon!

Of course, all of this costs money. And at this time of year the council has to make some difficult decisions about where we spend our money. This is made more and more difficult as the government has cut council budgets by more than 40% since 2010. Imagine if your boss cut your pay by 40%!

However, I'm a businessman so I've made sure we stretch every penny we have so that we can continue to provide the services you value the most. This year we've put £9m more into adult social care to look after older and disabled people in the borough and we've also invested more in children's services.

Although we've been forced to agree to charge the government's new adult social care precept, we've continued to freeze the core element of your council tax. We think it's important to keep council tax affordable when people are worried about how Brexit might affect their finances. You can find out more about the council's budget on page 16–17.

I'm so pleased I've been able to bring up my children here, and I want many more families to enjoy the same Merton experience my family has had!



Merton doing the right thing for children

Merton has recently taken in 22 children under the age of 17 who are from countries affected by violence and war, such as Syria, Iraq and Iran. The government gives us some money to cover the cost of care and housing for these children but we have to cover a lot of the costs ourselves. However, in Merton we think helping children is the right thing to do. It is certainly in the proud tradition of London, where so many people have escaped war and persecution in the past.

A great way you can help children, including refugee children, is by becoming a foster carer. On page 21 you can find out how rewarding it is to offer a child a place in your family. In Merton we know how important families are and we'll continue to look after all of our children, including offering refugee children the chance of happiness despite the war and violence they have experienced.



Bobbies back on the beat

They say an Englishman's home is his castle, which I think means we like to feel secure in our own houses! So I'm delighted at the news that the Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, has brought back neighbourhood policing. Every ward in Merton will soon have two dedicated police constables and a police community support officer.

Merton is already the third safest borough in London. But more "bobbies on the beat" is excellent news and can only make our community safer. We live in a really great borough where we all try to look after each other. But it's a bonus to know that we have local police officers who are keeping an eye on our neighbourhood and looking after our safety.

Keeping Merton informed

Carved in Stone

A heritage project has uncovered the life stories of more than 500 First World War combatants commemorated on local war memorials.

The two-year Carved in Stone project was financed by a £80,900 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund and run by the council's Heritage service. It was supported by a team of 39 volunteers and 29 organisations who shared their knowledge, resources and historic documents.

A total of 512 stories are now available alongside 1,436 wartime documents on the Carved in Stone website, which also features the Wimbledon and Merton Roll of Honour, listing those who fought in the conflict between 1914 and 1918.

Merton welcomes refugee family

Merton is the first London borough to welcome a refugee family as part of the government's Community Sponsorship Scheme. The council is working closely with partners, including the Salvation Army and Merton Clinical Commissioning Group, to resettle the family in the borough. The family, who had been living in a refugee camp, were identified as having high priority for resettlement because they are particularly vulnerable.

Merton tackles air pollution head-on

In response to a national health emergency and the Mayor of London's pledge to cut air pollution in the capital, Merton Council is making it easier for people to move to less polluting vehicles by installing a network of electric charging points. There are now 21 charging points with retractable cables across Merton and plans to expand the network. Users can download a free Smartphone app to find the nearest point, reserve it or report a fault. Network operator Source London will charge £2 per hour, with most cars fully charged in four hours.

To encourage drivers to ditch diesel in favour of cleaner fuels, the council is also proposing to phase in a levy on diesel



vehicles over the next three years. The levy will apply to resident, business and trade parking permits. The initial levy for 2017/18 will be £90

rising to £115 in 2018/19 and £150 in 2019/20.

New secondary school to meet demand for Merton education



Merton will see a new much-needed comprehensive secondary school open in September 2018.

Named Harris Wimbledon Academy, the school will be located on High Path, not far from South Wimbledon Underground Station. This is the area where the demand for school places is greatest. The new building will open its doors to pupils in 2020, but the first children to benefit from an education at the school will start in September 2018 at a temporary site in Whatley Avenue (SW20).

The council is working closely with the Education Funding Agency to ensure the school is value for money for the borough's taxpayers.

The development of
Harris Wimbledon Academy
follows Merton's successful
primary school expansion
programme, which created
over 4,000 new school places
to meet unprecedented
demand from parents who
want their children to be
educated in Merton.

More secondary school places will be created by the new school and also through the expansion of Harris Academy in Mitcham to provide an extra 300 places.

Borrow books at the touch of a button



Technology is allowing library users to borrow, return and renew items at the touch of a button.

Self-service technology and the support of volunteers has enabled Merton Council to keep all seven of its award-winning libraries open and extend their opening hours during recent years.

From I May, Colliers Wood, Raynes Park, Pollards Hill, and West Barnes libraries will all operate self-service periods during off peak times.

Wimbledon war hero remembered

Merton Council marked the 100th anniversary of the "act of valour" for which Wimbledon resident George Edward Cates was awarded the Victoria Cross during World War One. On 8 March 1917, 2nd Lieutenant Cates, who was born in Hartfield Road and educated at Rutlish School, sacrificed his own life to save his comrades. Having triggered a delayed action bomb, whilst deepening a trench at Bouchavesnes,

France, George used his own body to shield his fellow soldiers from the blast. He died from his wounds later that night, aged just 24. On the same date 100 years later, Mayor of Merton Councillor Brenda Fraser unveiled a commemorative stone near Wimbledon war memorial, Parkside, to honour the memory of George Cates.

Zero tolerance of abuse

Merton Council took a motorist to court and won after one of its civil enforcement officers was



racially abused while carrying out his job. The motorist was fined £600 and had to pay £100 in compensation to the officer following the December hearing at Wimbledon Magistrates Court.

The enforcement officer was issuing a penalty charge notice to the motorist's vehicle in Belvedere Avenue, Wimbledon, in November. He was wearing a body camera which recorded the incident and he immediately reported it to the police.

The defendant pleaded guilty to charges of racially aggravated intentional harassment and the use of threatening abusive words. This is a reminder that the council will never tolerate abuse or aggression towards its employees and will take action where necessary to prosecute those who act inappropriately. The council's parking enforcement officers play an important part in keeping Merton moving and ensuring motorists obey the Highway Code.

Merton in Bloom



Greenfingered residents, community groups, schools and businesses are being encouraged to sow and grow colourful displays of flowers to enter Merton in Bloom.

Merton in Bloom forms part of the Royal Horticultural Society's Britain in Bloom and London in Bloom competitions.

Together we can tackle child abuse

Residents who suspect that a child they know may be at risk of harm are being urged to report their concerns to the Merton Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH).

The MASH, a partnership of education and social care staff from Merton Council, the police and the NHS working together to protect children, is supporting the Department for Education's *Together, we can tackle child abuse* campaign. The campaign highlights how important it is for people to report any suspicions or concerns they have about a child who may be suffering abuse. New volunteering strategy to help the third sector

Following a consultation, a combined strategy to support the voluntary sector and to encourage more residents to get involved in volunteering is being drawn up by the Merton Partnership, which includes the council. The voluntary sector in Merton has grown during the last two years and the strategy aims to promote collaboration between organisations. It will also support voluntary groups to explore new sources of funding and equip trustees with the skills they need to take an active role on charity boards. The plans will encourage volunteering by recruiting more residents to help with community initiatives and also promoting the benefits to businesses of employee volunteering schemes.

Watch live footage of nesting peregrine falcons

A live webcam will stream footage of protected peregrine falcon chicks onto our website for the first time as they hatch on the Civic Centre roof for the third year in a row.

Peregrine falcons have been nesting on the roof since 2015 and are monitored by the council and the London Peregrine Partnership. Last year four chicks hatched.

The female normally lays three or four eggs in late March or April, which hatch about a month later. The chicks fledge at 38 to 44-days-old and the adults spend around two months teaching them to hunt before they become independent.

Free childcare

Did you know your two-yearold child could enjoy up to 15 hours of free early education and childcare a week?

Parents whose total household income is £16,190 or less and are claiming certain out-of-work benefits or Working Tax Credit are eligible to claim help with childcare costs.

They could get up to 570 hours of childcare a year free of charge and, if working, may also qualify for help to reduce the cost of any additional childcare needed.

Pre-school children get active

The All England Lawn Tennis Club (AELTC) is launching an early years event to help improve the physical activity habits of children in Merton. Following a successful pilot, AELTC Head Coach Dan Bloxham has been training local early years teachers to deliver ten minutes of fun yet healthy physical



activity in the classroom every day. Mr Bloxham said: "Activities focus on co-ordination, agility, balance and strength but ultimately we want to get them moving and get the oxygen flowing, which will help them throughout the school day.

Sport brings so many good

values to the children in terms of focus, discipline, energy and teamwork and we're confident schools will quickly see the benefits." Through the AELTC tennis programmes, an AELTC coach is now delivering tennis to a Merton school every day of the school week.

Your views on public services

Merton Council's overview and scrutiny panels regularly review issues and services that affect residents. These reviews involve finding out about local people's experiences and looking at how other areas deal with the same challenges. The panels then suggest new ways to work in Merton. Past reviews have covered issues including diabetes prevention, employment opportunities for care leavers, improving air quality and tackling loneliness among older people. Positive justice

My Merton speaks to Ruth Hearty to find out why she loves her job working with young people in Merton Council's Youth Justice Service.

ots of young people have turned their lives around and got jobs or found a new passion for skills including cooking thanks to the dedication of people like Ruth Hearty.

As Reparation Coordinator for Merton Council's Youth Justice Service, Ruth and her team work with young people aged 13 to 18-years-old who have been convicted of an offence and as part of their rehabilitation have to give back to the community.

Every Saturday morning and during the week, the team run a variety of activities and schemes including community tidying, animal care and horse management and first aid.

The Recycle a Cycle project encourages young people to connect with victims of bike theft and see how it has affected them. Lost or stolen bicycles are donated by Merton Police, and then they are repaired and recycled. The young people also cook up a storm in the kitchen where they make cakes for elderly residents at a nursing home in Lower Morden. Many take a Level 2 City and Guilds qualification in food and hygiene which gives them the skills and experience to get jobs in the catering

industry, something many of them would not have thought of before.

These courses allow participants to gain qualifications, skills and experience to help them move forward positively in their lives. Many return to take part in the courses voluntarily because they enjoy it so much.

Ruth believes the key to engaging with the young people is to be positive. She said: "I believe praise and encouragement helps them feel good about themselves and want to do well. Seeing the difference from start to finish is incredibly rewarding. Some of the young people come to us and they are not very confident, many of them have been through a lot, but they quickly realise my colleagues and I want the best for them."

Despite its challenges, Ruth said: "This is the best job of my life, I love it. It is so rewarding. I'm lucky that I get to know all the young people I work with and see them blossom."

New waste and parks contracts save taxpayers millions

This spring two new companies will begin providing Merton Council's waste collection and street cleaning services and maintenance of our parks and open spaces, saving Merton Council taxpayers an estimated £2million a year.

We know that cleaner streets, waste and recycling collections and green spaces are all big priorities for you. With continued pressure on budgets, the council needs to find new ways of delivering these to a high standard but at a lower cost.

We have been working with Croydon, Sutton and Kingston councils to agree a waste collection and street cleaning contract across all four boroughs. We have also agreed a joint parks contract with Sutton Council. The contracts mean better value for money, improved efficiency and environmental benefits. After a careful, two-year bidding process, leading environmental services company Veolia has been selected to provide all our waste collection, recycling, street cleaning, commercial waste, winter maintenance and vehicle maintenance. The contract will begin on I April.

A second contract, awarded to specialist landscape company *i*dverde, began operating from I February, covering all our parks and grounds maintenance services, cemeteries, sports pitches and play facilities.

The contracting process has been managed by the South London Waste Partnership which brings together the same four boroughs which have already successfully agreed the landfill and energy from waste facility. The partnership also manages all the household waste and recycling centres in the four boroughs.

Residents will continue to receive the same services under the new contracts until October 2018, when wheelie bins for recycling and general waste are introduced.

The decision to roll out wheelie bins to residents across the borough follows a successful trial of the system in Lavender ward in 2015, which saw high rates of customer satisfaction. During the six-month pilot scheme of 1,000 homes, 89% of participants said they were happy with the service and 81% agreed that the streets looked cleaner. Recycling rates increased too, as the enclosed wheelie bins protect material from wet weather.

Regular round-up



We are making recycling easier for residents who live in flats with a communal bin area. In partnership with cleaners and caretakers, we are increasing the number of recycling bins and giving the existing ones a spruce up, putting up clear signs and distributing leaflets and free reusable recycling bags. We have also raised awareness among residents about the range of rubbish which can be recycled by distributing leaflets, holding information events and knocking on people's doors. Follow-up visits have provided ongoing support.

On the Baron's Estate in Mitcham, residents now recycle more than they did before the improvements were made and we are continuing to support them to recycle even more. Circle Housing estate cleaner Mark Crosby said: "We have worked closely with the council to increase the number of recycling bins almost three fold, tidied up the area and kept people informed. Residents have really got on board and are recycling much more. The whole area looks smarter too." Pictured above: Mark Crosby at the Baron's Estate in Mitcham.

Did you know that you can recycle batteries, hard plastic, electrical items. furniture and wood at our Household Reuse and Recycling Centre? The centre in Amenity Way, off Garth Road in Morden,



also accepts books, oil, printer cartridges and scrap metal.

Please sort your recycling before arriving and remember to take along your recent council tax bill or driving licence as proof that you are a Merton resident.

Paper and card, cans, foil, glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles, tubs and trays and cartons can all be recycled from your kerbside.

Garden waste

Now spring is just about here, you might be thinking about getting out in the garden, cutting back shrubs and mowing the lawn. You can take your garden waste to Merton Council's Household Reuse and Recycling Centre in Amenity Way off Garth Road in Morden or you can sign up for our garden waste collection service.

We will collect your garden waste every fortnight (with a break after Christmas and in January when there is not much growth) including grass cuttings, hedge trimmings, twigs and leaves, which are all compostable. For £70 a year from 1 April (or £65 a year for new customers signing up in March) you will get fortnightly collections and a garden waste bin (or 24 garden waste collection bags if you have no space for a bin).

Celebrating 125 years of educating young women

Ursuline High School in Wimbledon grew from just three students to become one of the country's top schools. *My Merton* looks at its history.

rsuline High School in
Wimbledon celebrates its
125th anniversary this year.
The Catholic school for girls,
which is rated amongst the top 100
non-selective schools in the country,
prides itself on offering an excellent
education to young women, whilst
celebrating the extraordinary potential
of each 11 to 18-year-old girl.

The history of the school began in 16th century Italy where one such extraordinary woman, St Angela of Merici, was born. Very much a female in a man's world, Angela was well known for moving amongst the rich and influential, reconciling their differences, at the same time as helping the poor and needy. She founded the order of Ursulines in 1535, named after the early British Saint Ursula, a patron of learning.

Ursuline orders grew up across the world, including in London. In 1892 a community of nuns from Forest Gate came to Wimbledon and founded a school at a house on Worple Road. From humble beginnings – its first pupil, Netta Powell, was one of only three students – the school grew and moved to The Downs in 1901, where it occupied the much larger Claremont building.

It continued to attract strong women – in 1912 one teacher, Miss Fenell, chaired meetings of the Wimbledon branch of the


Catholic Women's Suffrage Society. Showing concern for the needy, the Ursuline school took in refugees from France and Belgium during World War II. Pip, the resident dog, kept boarders safe by howling to warn of air raids.

The school has had various incarnations, from a private boarding school and girls' grammar, to a comprehensive, founded in 1969 together with a new sixth form. Over time new facilities have been added – the latest being playing fields and a pavilion, negotiated by the council with a developer as part of a planning agreement, which are due to open in September.

To mark its 125th year, the school has been holding concerts, debates and faith events as well as a reception in the House of Lords. There will be a production of *Evita* performed at the Epsom Playhouse later this month, plus a whole school mass at Westminster Cathedral in April.

1999: School becomes 11-18 and opens Merici Sports Centre and St Ursula's building.


2010: New sixth form centre opens with a pastoral centre.

Future Merton

With the countdown to our new library opening and the regeneration of housing estates progressing, Future Merton is taking shape.



Colliers Wood's new library is on track to open this summer after a two year project to rebuild it as part of a striking development which also includes apartments for sale and rent.

Residents' views have been crucial to the project from the start, with consultation helping define what facilities the library will contain – a coffee shop, children's library, meeting rooms and plenty of spaces for books were all priorities.

In a final piece of consultation, library customers were asked to comment on options for the interior through events and surveys, accessible both online and at each of Merton's seven libraries. The results revealed that library users were keen for a flexible space; most opted for neutral decor with an injection of vibrant colours to aid creativity.

The seven-floor building includes three levels of library space – the basement, ground floor and mezzanine – below the apartments. The library will include a children's area and, on the mezzanine level, three flexible rooms which can be joined together to create an even larger space.

The new library replaces an ageing 1970s building and follows negotiations by the council to secure a good deal by incorporating the library into a development built by Rocco Homes.

What's new in Wimbledon?

The Future Wimbledon project is about shaping a vision for Wimbledon town as a destination for residents and shoppers and a centre for economic growth.

As part of the project the council is now preparing a masterplan that will guide development and investment decisions for the next 15 years. During January and February residents and businesses were invited to help influence the town's future at interactive workshops which gave them the chance to talk about the buildings and spaces in the area and the community aspirations for future development. Thank you to everyone who got involved.

The Future Merton team are currently considering all their ideas to help inform the plan.

Estates revamp latest

Ambitious plans to regenerate three of the borough's housing estates will move forward in March with the submission of the Estates Local Plan to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government.

The plan sets out a framework for the multi-million pound redevelopment of the Eastfields estate in Mitcham, High Path estate in South Wimbledon and Ravensbury estate in Morden, and has been written with the views and ideas of residents very much in mind.

Over the past two years Merton Council and Clarion Housing (formerly Circle Housing), the housing association which owns most of the estates, have been consulting residents about the future of their homes.

Built in the 1950s and 1960s, the properties are ageing and expensive to heat and maintain. Rebuilding them is seen as a better way of bringing them up to a decent standard than renovating them bit by bit.

Clarion Housing want to create new homes which are attractive, modern, energy efficient and well-landscaped. There would be homes for existing residents along with around 1,000 more properties built across the three sites.

While the project represents an important, long-term investment in affordable housing in the borough and a big improvement to quality of life for residents, we want to make sure residents get the best deal possible and their voices are heard – which is why their input in the estates local plan has been so important.

Looking after the pennies

Every year Merton Council needs to decide how to spend its money in the year to come and how it will pay for services. *My Merton* looks at this year's budget.

unning a council and services such as rubbish collection, social services and parks, is a bit like running your household budget. You need to look at how much money you have coming in, such as wages or a pension, and decide what you can afford to spend your money on and what you can't.

You might ask yourself questions like: Should you get a loan to buy a new car or continue to pay out to repair the old one? Can you afford to buy the kids the latest fashions or do you need to say no? Will you have enough for your holiday? And what will you do if the company cuts your wages and your income goes down, or your mum gets ill and you need to drop everything to look after her?

Obviously local councils are dealing with much bigger amounts of money than our household budgets. And they have to keep 80,000 residents happy, not just a family of four. But similar decisions have to be made.

This year Merton Council has decided to invest extra money into services used by vulnerable adults and children. We're also investing in families and in good quality public services that can be used by all our residents. By cutting waste across the council, money is available for the services families enjoy.

Just like with household budgets, there have been some difficult choices to make, but we're confident we have planned our spending in a business-like way that will help all our residents while keeping Merton an affordable borough.




This year Merton Council has decided to invest f 9m extra in adult social care. Across the country an increasing number of older and disabled people need council help. It's great that more people are living longer but it means that many more people need care services to help them live in their own home for longer and more and more people need help to pay for their care in later life.

In Merton we think it's important to properly fund adult social care. We don't think the government is doing enough to help. But we're making our own decision to prioritise funding for older and disabled residents.



Balancing the borough's budget



We've also decided to spend £Im extra on children's services. Merton has become known as a great place to bring up your family which is why more people are moving here and starting a family. That's why we've expanded our primary schools to provide more than 4,000 extra places since 2010. We're now starting on secondary schools, with 300 more places planned at Harris Merton in Mitcham and a new secondary school planned for South Wimbledon.

With a new leisure centre planned to open next year in Morden and a new library in Colliers Wood, Merton really is a great place for families.

Council tax

We've frozen your council tax for six years in a row, including for those on low pay. We're one of only a few boroughs to have done this because of our good financial management. We're freezing the core element of your council tax again this year.

But the government has cut funding to local councils by over 40% since 2010. Imagine what that would do to your household budget. At the same time, there is a crisis in adult social care in this country. More people are living longer and need help in their old age.

But the government haven't given councils any extra money to help pay for adult social care. Instead they have created a new council tax increase called a "precept", which they expect all local councils to charge. So your council tax will increase overall by the government's 3% precept. However we have kept the core Merton element the same, as we have done for the last six years.

We know many residents are worried about what Brexit will do to their finances so we don't want to make things more difficult than they already are. That's why we are freezing the core element of your council tax.

Everyone is welcome in Merton

That is the joint message of reassurance from all three party leaders on Merton Council after recent international events have triggered unrest across the world.

Over the last year Merton Council has worked tirelessly with partners including Merton Police to promote community cohesion across the borough.

In Merton reported incidents of hate crime were higher last year than in other, similar boroughs. We want people to come forward and report hate crime and our data shows that some sections of the community are doing so.

But while racially-motivated crimes are being reported, incidents of bullying and intimidation against people who are disabled or transgender are almost all under the radar. Hate crimes are those motivated by a hostility or prejudice based on personal characteristics, which could be the victim's race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or transgender identity.

"When I am in my wheelchair, people touch me even if I don't want them to," says Samantha, a young woman who attributes the sexual harassment she has encountered to being disabled. "Other times, people treat me like a nuisance, as if I am getting in the way. I got stalked once and I had to report

that to the police. I believe he targeted me because of my vulnerability."

Samantha approached the police; however, disabled people's organisation Merton Centre for Independent Living (CIL) found that only two in 100 disabled people who have experienced hate crime feel able to do so.

Merton CIL's Chief Executive, Lyla Adwan-Kamara said: "We have been working with disabled survivors of hate crime, including survivors of physical and financial abuse, to build up their confidence to stand up to the perpetrators. It takes many hours of support before people feel able to take action and to approach the police, and our team are able to help them with that process."




More police on the beat

Fostering is a way of providing a family life for a child who is unable to live at home and Merton Council is looking for new foster carers. Ahead of Foster Care Fortnight, which runs between from 8-21 May, My Merton talked to a foster carer to find out more about what fostering involves.

've learned more in five years of fostering than working for 15 years!" says Merton foster carer Sarah*. "Children teach you so much; about life, actually, so for me it's been really interesting."

Sarah is a short-term foster carer for children aged between four and ten. In the time she's been fostering she has looked after 13 children; one for just over a year and others for a couple of nights.

Fostering was something she had thought about a lot and once her own children were teenagers, the time seemed right.

"I started to work with children with disabilities, giving respite to families. I got to a stage where I thought I could give a little bit more and was thinking that maybe I could go down the avenue of fostering."

Sarah's fostering journey has been deeply rewarding – for both her and her family. "Within your own family sometimes life is lovely and I don't think your children understand what life can be like out there. It's been quite educational for them because every child who comes through the door is different."

"The children have individual challenges, of course, but we deal with these day-byday. That's just family life! You deal with the problem and try and make the child's life as nice as possible. And at home they're not challenging because we have really good boundaries and routines.

"You have to be very open-minded and inquisitive. There's plenty of support and you have to use it. You're going to meet so much along the way, but if you ask questions, find a buddy, join support groups, it's all there for you - and it's certainly very rewarding!"

There is currently a shortage of foster carers for older children, particularly teenagers.

Mani and Steve, a couple from Merton, currently care for teenagers in the borough. Steve explained why they chose to foster older children. He said: "We really wanted to care for teenagers as we thought our skills would be better suited to the II plus age group. When they grow to trust you

and understand that you will not judge them, that is the most rewarding part of the job. We tell them we will always be there for them no matter what."

To become a foster carer you need to have a spare bedroom, some experience of young people, as well as patience, resilience and understanding. You don't need to be super parents, but you do need to have the desire to help and offer the young person a safe and secure place to live.

Weighing in on a major issue

More people from Merton than in any other London borough responded to the Great Weight Debate, an online survey which aimed to start a conversation about childhood obesity.

The initiative, by the Healthy London Partnership, asked if Londoners were aware of the extent of childhood obesity in the capital; factors they think contribute to childhood obesity and what can be done to help children and families lead healthier lives.



More than 300 Merton residents responded to the debate, which took place between October and December, with most agreeing that childhood obesity should be a high priority for London.

When asked about what makes it harder for children to lead healthy lives, Merton respondents said that the large numbers of cheap, unhealthy food options and fast food shops are an issue. Some residents also highlighted concerns about letting children play outside unsupervised.

Suggestions to reduce childhood

unhealthy food; increasing the availability of cheaper healthier food and drinks and raising awareness of what a healthy weight is.

Changes require both national and local action to make the healthiest options the easiest and preferred choice. Locally, we have developed a child healthy weight action plan in partnership with the NHS, schools, community groups and voluntary organisations.

This includes ideas to increase the use of parks and outdoor spaces and increase outdoor activities and the use of leisure facilities. Supporting food businesses to offer more healthy options and increasing children and families' knowledge about what a healthy weight is are also in the plans.

Around 4,500 primary school children in Merton are estimated to be overweight or obese. One in five children starting Reception Year is overweight and this increases to one in three pupils in Year 6, the final year of primary school.

Childhood obesity is the subject of this year's annual report by Merton Council's Director of Public Health, which was published in February. Tackling Childhood Obesity Together by Dr Dagmar Zeuner gathers the facts and figures about childhood obesity in Merton. The report sums up the challenge we face as a community and presents a call to action on tackling the issue.

This is putting



children at risk of illnesses which could potentially be life-threatening.

Chief Superintendent Steve Wallace

The new Borough Commander of Merton who took over on 6 March has been in the police for 25 Years. His career has included time in Leicestershire, Hampshire and the Metropolitan Police and a national role in Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary Inspecting Forces.

What made you decide to become a police officer? I joined the police with the intention of doing the right thing for the victims of crime as well as investigating, prosecuting and getting criminals locked up.

What do you enjoy most about your job? It is the best job in the world and I feel privileged to be able to serve the public. I enjoy knowing I make a difference to people's lives every single day by providing leadership and support to my staff - who are totally committed to making Merton a safer place.

What are your plans for Merton? Firstly, policing is not just about crunching numbers, it is about the quality of what we deliver and remembering that behind every crime is a victim. Secondly, I ask that my staff work together as one team, for example neighbourhood teams and CID. Thirdly, it is about making every day count.

Why is partnership working between the police and Merton Council so important?

The police alone cannot solve society's problems and Merton Council plays an integral part in people's lives with its links to diverse communities. Protecting vulnerable people is at the forefront of what we do and we achieve that by working in partnership with the council.

How can residents get involved in keeping Merton safe? People are so interested in the job the police do — I often see people reading crime books on the Tube and television shows about detectives are very popular. Merton is the third safest borough in London but I want us to become the safest borough by working in partnership with the council and by getting more Merton residents involved in volunteering with the police, or coordinating a neighbourhood watch to share information and keep our borough safe.
